This is not your usual Torch newsletter, nor is it Pastor Glenn! It is only me, Margie, writing to you from my room at Bacharach Rehab Center. I had the bilateral (2 knees) surgery last week on Friday, Nov. 20. After a rough few days, I was transferred to The Bacharach Institute for Rehabilitation on 11/24. I am now sleeping all night, which is a big accomplishment! Before that, I would only sleep 1-2 hours each night, all the while in quite a bit of pain and distress. The night hours passed very slow.

I praise the Lord for his goodness and mercy helping me to get through those late night and early morning hours. During that time I thought of the people in my family who also endured pain from major surgeries and hospital stays when their bodies failed them. Images of my husband, George during the last two weeks of his life flashed through my mind. You do not fully realize what someone else is going through until you experience intense pain and immobility yourself. I also thought of my Mother and how strong she was. In her 90 years of life, she had experienced several surgeries and cancer treatments. I remembered how my she walked with a limp in her older age. She probably should've had knee surgery but chose not to. Many of you remember praying for my nephew, Danny Gilliam Jr., who fell off a scaffolding almost 2 years ago now. He was bedbound for over 9 months! I thought of the things that they all must have endured.

My hours were filled with prayers that I could be as brave as my family had been through their hours of pain. Little things like being able to walk, sleep and even go to the bathroom should not be taken for granted. Each one of these things is a gift from God... our bodies are living miracles!

Now I am 3 days into my rehab and the physical therapist gave me an A+ today. Each day is a little better. Today, on this day of Thanksgiving, I have so much to be thankful for. My family and my friends at Tabernacle and beyond have been so supportive and loving. I have found ways while in the hospital to be helpful and caring to others. The Lord continues to give me opportunities to share my faith and His love every day. Looking on the bright side might sound simple, but it works! Humor has also played a big part in my recovery. I wish you all a healthy and joy filled Thanksgiving.
